
## Message from the President

Throughout Hunter's history, its faculty and staff have been tapped by government and private funders for their groundbreaking and imaginative solutions to local, national and global problems in areas ranging from public health to education to biomedical research.

The far-reaching expertise on our campus has received no greater recognition than in fiscal year 2001. For the first time in its history, Hunter reached the \$30 million plateau in grant and contract awards. Research in the area of biomedical sciences rose by 33%. Training grants for prospective and in-service social workers, teachers, nurses and professionals in health-related fields also increased significantly.

Hunter continues its tradition of excellence by building on the strengths of its faculty and enhancing research and training opportunities for its student body. Since my arrival at Hunter, I have been impressed by the faculty's commitment to provide students with research training, internships and other experiences that will prepare them to be leaders in the 21<sup>st</sup> century.

My warmest congratulations to the faculty, staff and students who made 2001 a banner year in grants and contracts.

## Opening Remarks

June 2001 was memorable for Hunter College. Hunter's new President, Jennifer J. Raab, arrived on June 11th. The month closed the fiscal year with Hunter College having reached \$30 million in grants and contracts for the first time in its history, concluding a very successful year.

Grant and contract proposals at Hunter College are almost exclusively originated by faculty and staff. Thanks to their efforts the College was awarded more than \$15 million in federal awards, with another \$7 million coming directly from agencies of New York City and State. Collaborations with a multitude of non-profit organizations including prestigious universities and medical centers brought additional grants and subcontracts, with much of that money coming from government flow-through funding. Awards from foundations and corporations completed the mix of funding that supports more than 370 projects.

Notable among the new grants awarded in the year were:

- A Specialized Neuroscience Research Program grant was awarded by the National Institutes of Health, supporting research in Biological Sciences and Psychology.
- The Howard Hughes Medical Institute made a significant grant to Biological Sciences to support curriculum and program development.
- New federally-supported research grants in the Schools of the Health Professions, one of the projects in collaboration with the Center on AIDS, Drugs and Community Health, lifted the profile of research at the Brookdale Campus.
- Projects supported at the School of Social Work and the Brookdale Center on Aging have highlighted the talents of faculty and staff in preparing professionals in gerontology.
- New federal and state grants to the School of Education recognized the contributions of the College to bilingual education and the preparation of teachers of the visually impaired and severely multiply handicapped populations.
- The renewal of the Research Center in Minority Institutions grant heralded the achievements of many faculty in Biological Sciences, Chemistry, Physics & Astronomy, and Psychology.
- While a Distinguished Professor of Psychology was learning that his NIH research would be funded for the 40<sup>th</sup> consecutive year, that department's new faculty also gained funding.

We recognize the efforts of all who had a role in competing successfully for grants and contracts. This appreciation extends to the members of the Committee for the Protection of Human Subjects from Research Risks, the Institutional Animal Care and Use Committee, and the Institutional Biohazards Committee, as well as the faculty on policy and research committees in the many departments and schools which conduct pre-reviews and provide valuable feedback to improve proposals. Our thanks also to those who serve as mentors and informal advisors to our principal investigators.

# SECTION I-A: OVERVIEW OF EXTERNAL FUNDING

This section contain statistical information on grants and contracts from external sources, i.e., agencies for Federal, State and City government, foundations, corporations, and non-profit organizations. For the sake of making comparisons, figures are given for the quarter century beginning July 1, 1976.

Grants and contract have undergone remarkable growth since the late 1970's. Viewing awards in ten year increments, we used 1981 as the initial base year to illustrate growth.

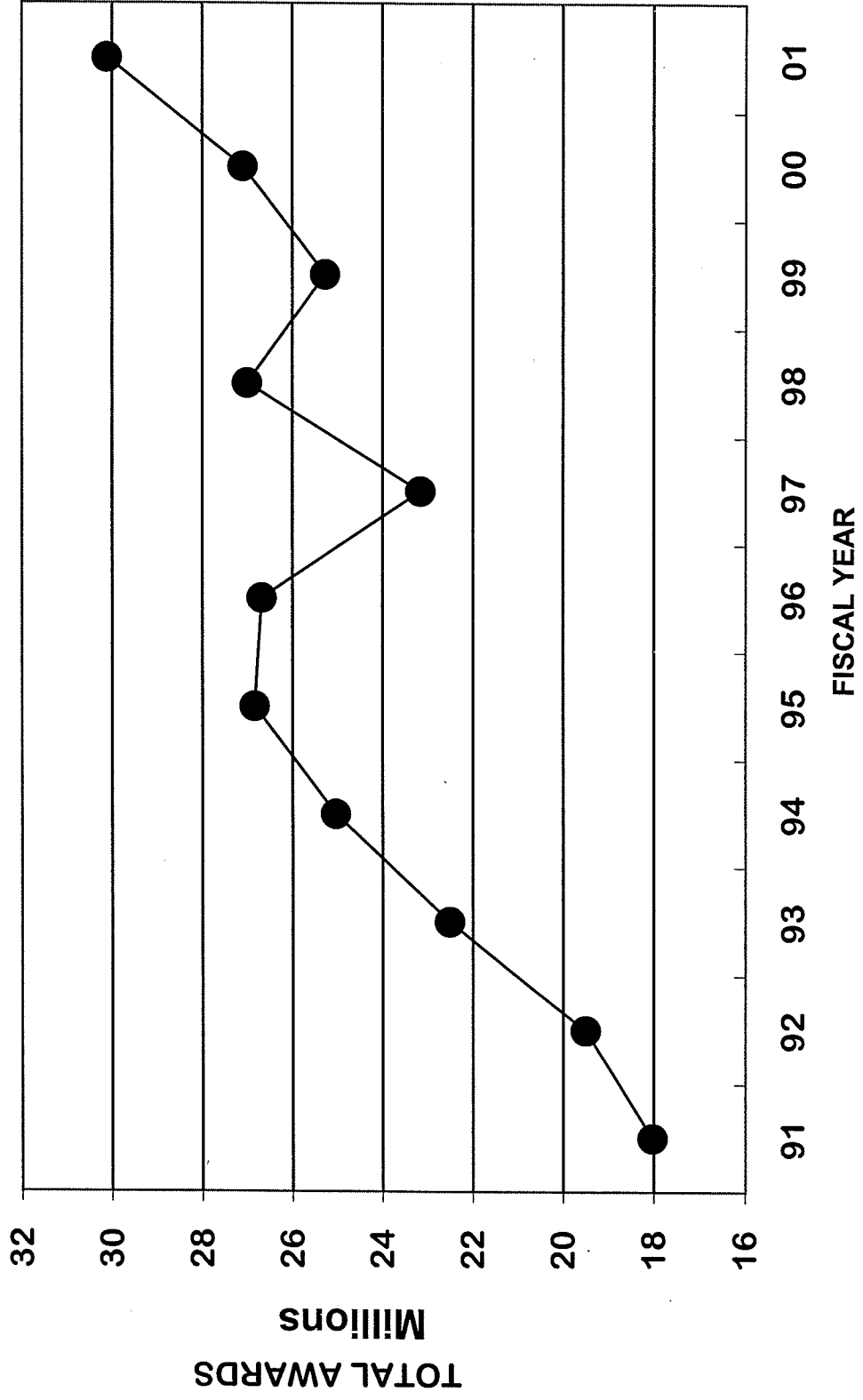
## PERCENT INCREASE IN DOLLAR VOLUME BY SOURCE BY DECADE SINCE 1981

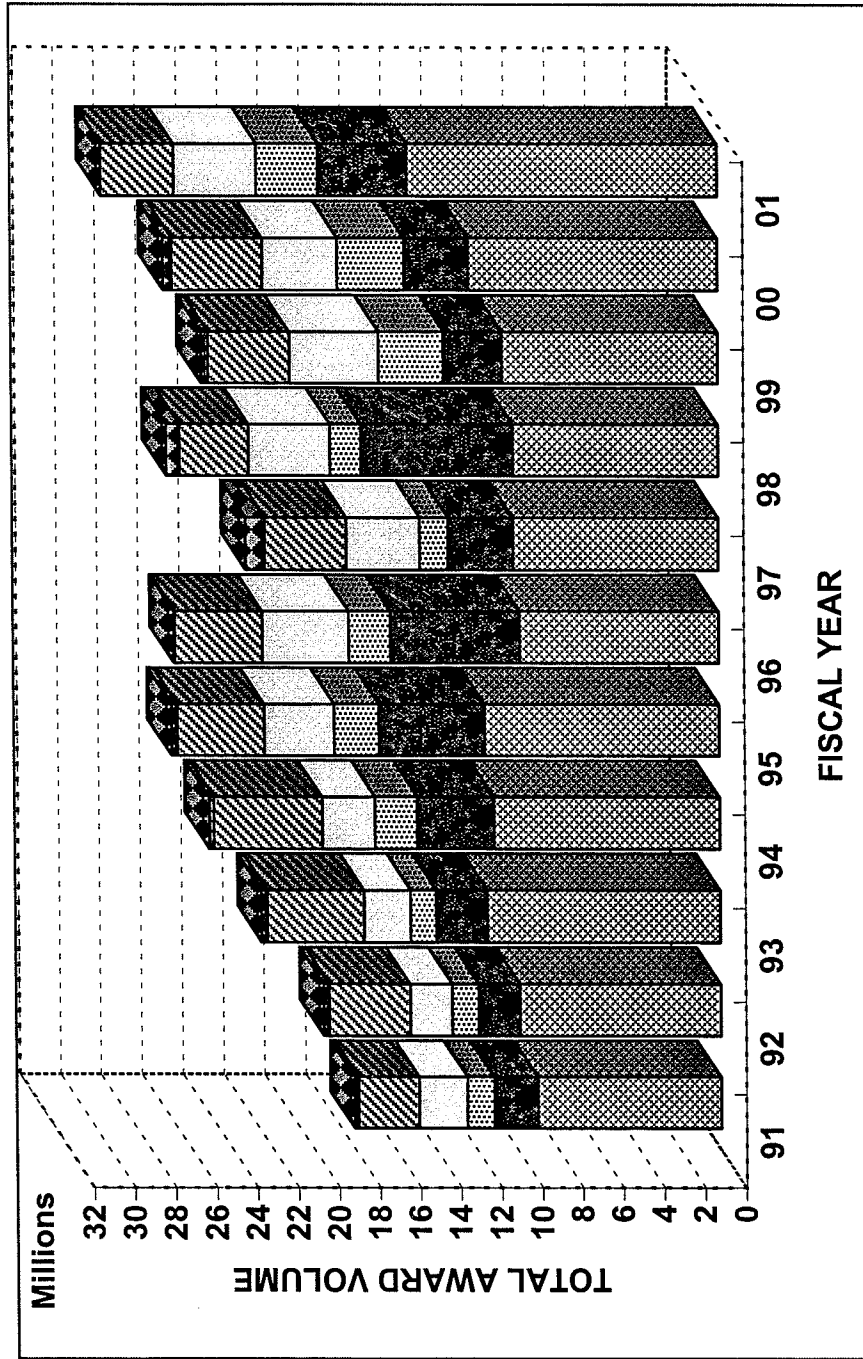

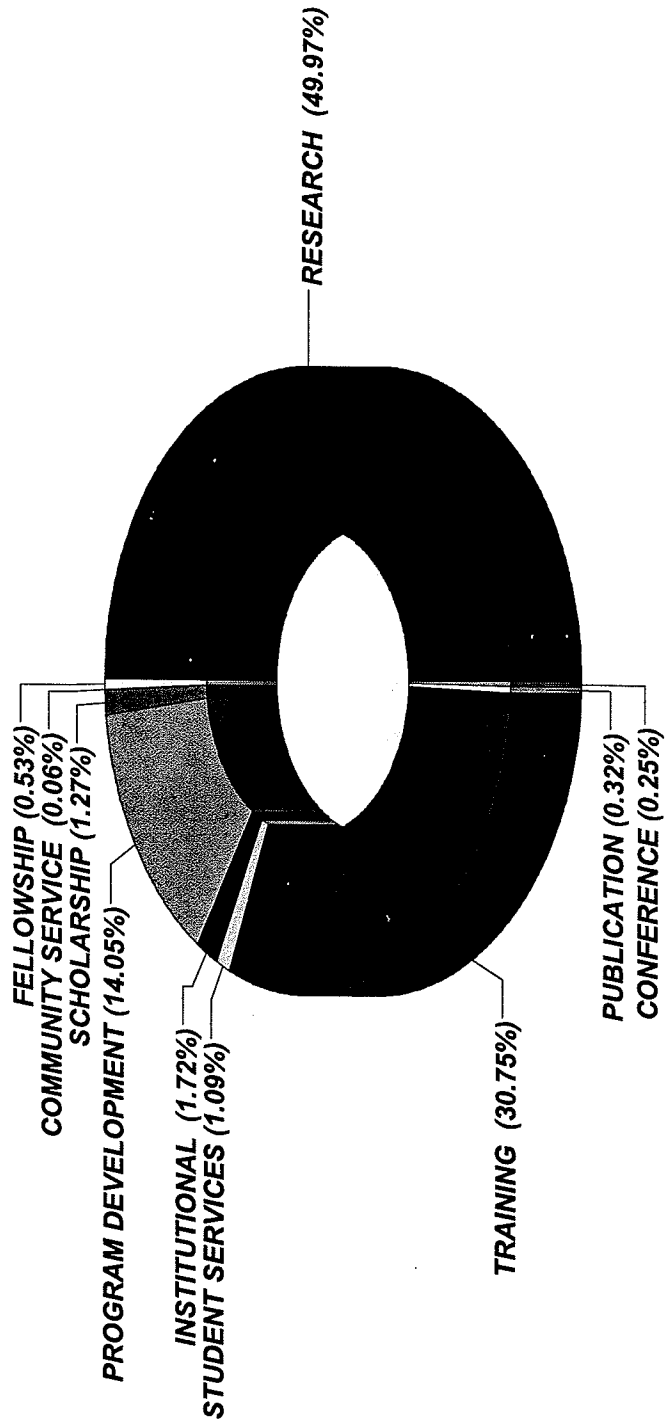

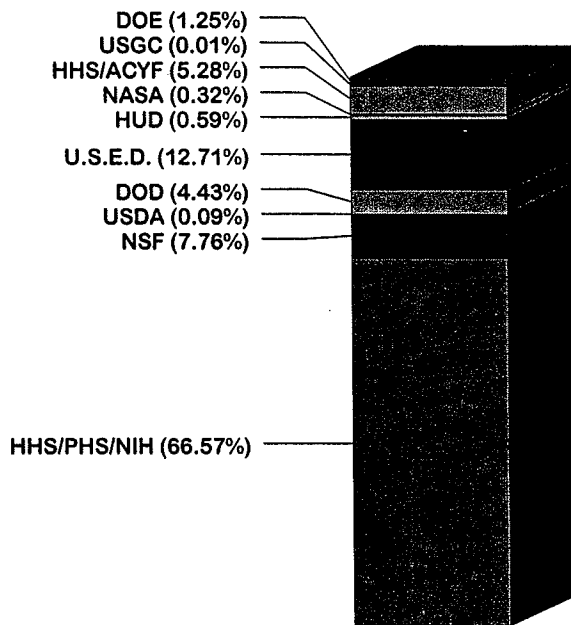
