## Message from the President

The achievements of Hunter College faculty and staff were recognized in a most tangible manner in fiscal year 2002 by a record \$37.8 million in grant and contract awards. This figure represents an increase of 30% above the prior year.

Expertise at Hunter covers a wide range of disciplines and professions. Agencies in the public and private sectors have funded a myriad of projects in basic and applied research. Peer review panels regularly recognize the contributions to research by Hunter faculty. The value of a Hunter degree is demonstrated the College's ability to attract grants for training students preparing for careers in the arts and humanities, education, health professions, the biomedical, natural and social sciences, and social work.

Hunter faculty, staff and students are an invaluable asset to our city and state, and this was evidenced by a significant increase in awards from regional agencies. Similarly, the number of federal grants increased by a third, with federal grants constituting half of our grant total.

We congratulate everyone at Hunter who made 2002 a record year.

Having joined the Hunter College community in September, 2002, this is the first time that I have had the opportunity to contribute *Opening Remarks* to the **Annual Report of Grants and Contracts**. Hunter College had a record-setting grant year in 2001-2002 and it is a pleasure for me to acknowledge that fact. It is clear that the faculty of Hunter College is rich in knowledge and experience, with a genuine desire to contribute to their respective fields of study and to prepare students for the challenges that await them.

Collaborations between members of the Hunter community and colleagues from other CUNY colleges, government agencies, private universities, hospitals, and non-profit organizations have added to the wealth of resources available to our faculty and students.

We recognize that applying for and directing a grant take time and effort. Faculty and staff have been dealing with more stringent interpretations of regulations on protection of human subjects. The electronic submission of proposals, being adopted by several agencies, has not always proceeded smoothly. Despite these hurdles, the number of proposal submissions continues to increase. This is a credit to the dedication of the Hunter faculty.

Proposals for grants and contracts are generally subject to peer review by funding sources. We acknowledge the members of the faculty who participate in this process with colleagues from around the country. Within the CUNY system, we also appreciate all those who serve on the University Committee on Research Awards, who review proposals for various CUNY-wide programs, and who serve on the Hunter College President's Committee on Research Awards. We salute the members of the faculty who serve as mentors to junior faculty and students, and who provide colleagues with important feedback on drafts of proposals.

The College administration wishes to thank the faculty, staff and community representatives who serve on the Committee for the Protection of Human Subjects from Research Risks (also known as the Institutional Review Board), the Institutional Animal Care and Use Committee, and the Institutional Biohazards Committee, all of which must function properly in order for anyone at the College to conduct research.

I look forward to continuing to work with the Hunter community to promote research and scholarship.

## Director's Remarks

When I assumed the position of Director of Research Administration on July 1, 1977, Hunter grants had totaled \$3.2 million in the previous year. Hunter was third in grants in the CUNY system, behind City College and the Graduate Center. There had been a decade of growth of student body and faculty alike. The School of Health Sciences was completing its time in rented space at 106<sup>th</sup> Street. A number of departments and programs now at 68<sup>th</sup> Street was scattered around the Hunter neighborhood. Programs in the School of Education were on Lexington Avenue at 466 (along with Hunter High School) and 560, as well as 505 Park Avenue and at the Brookdale Campus. Urban Affairs and Planning was on Madison Avenue. Others were in an old City building on the current site of the East Building. Hunter Elementary was at 54<sup>th</sup> Street. Classrooms for the College's classes were rented at Temple Emanu-El and Julia Richman High School. The majority of the Business Office and Human Resources staffs were in a building with the FBI at 69<sup>th</sup> Street and Third Avenue, and later at the Foundling Hospital. The positive aspect to all this is that it made the whole of New York City our campus. If only our geographic information capabilities had been developed at that time!

Despite the inconveniences of small, shared and widely dispersed facilities, grant proposals began to be submitted with increased frequency. We rapidly moved from fewer than 100 proposals in 1977. Awards reached the \$5 million level in 1980, \$10 million in 1986, \$15 million in 1990. By that time, Hunter was a strong second in grant volume within CUNY. The \$20 and \$25 million plateaus were reached in successively in 1993 and 1994.

The last two years have brought a new surge of proposal activity and awards. Proposals and continuation applications now surpass 600. Having reached \$30 million for the first time in 2000-2001, awards showed an incredible increase of \$10 million in the 2001-2002, this despite the year's tragedy and distractions related to terrorism.

My congratulations and thanks to all who made my 25<sup>th</sup> year as grants officer a memorable one.

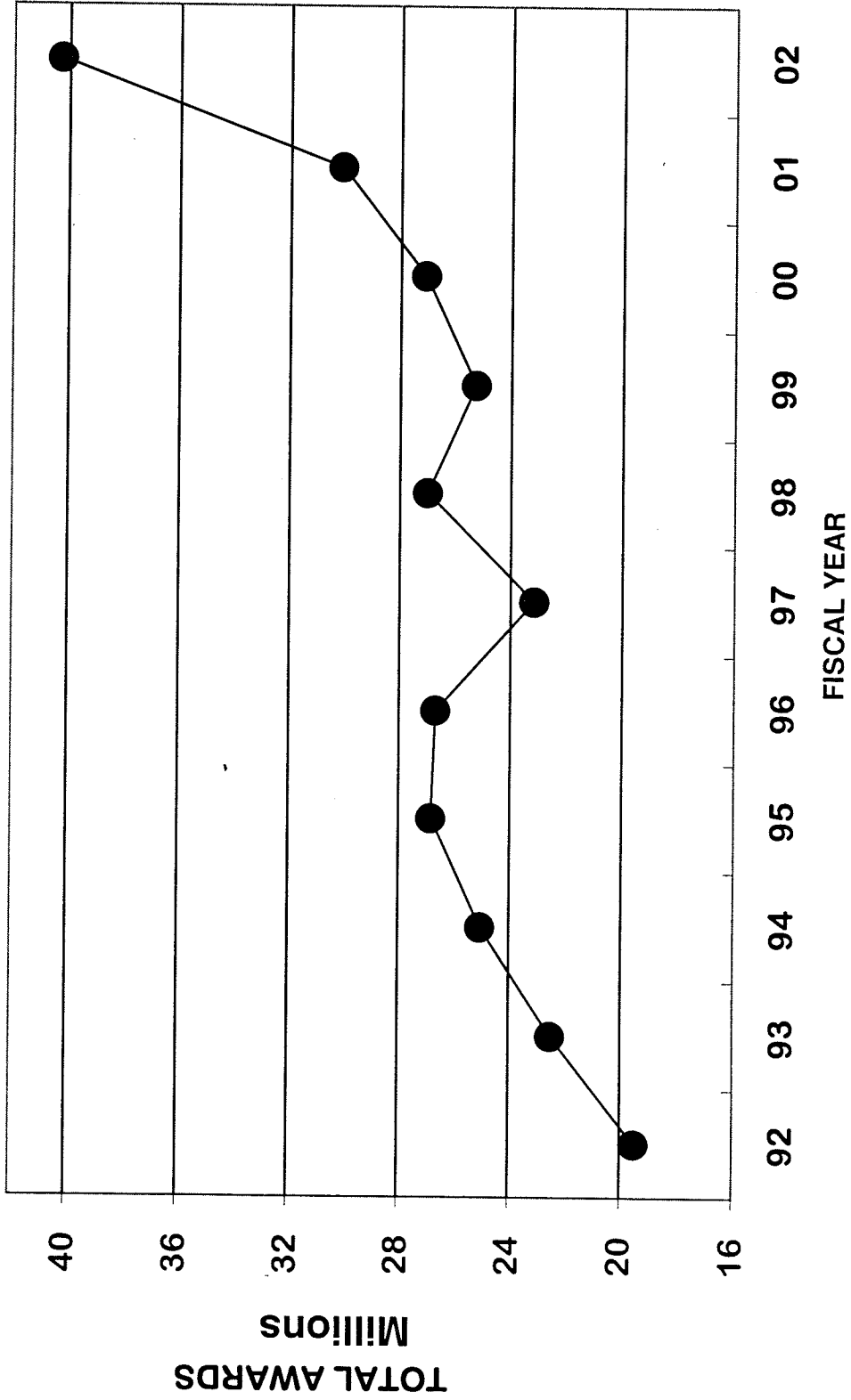
Grants and contracts have undergone remarkable growth since the late 1970s. Viewing awards in ten year increments, we used 1982 as the initial base year to illustrate growth.

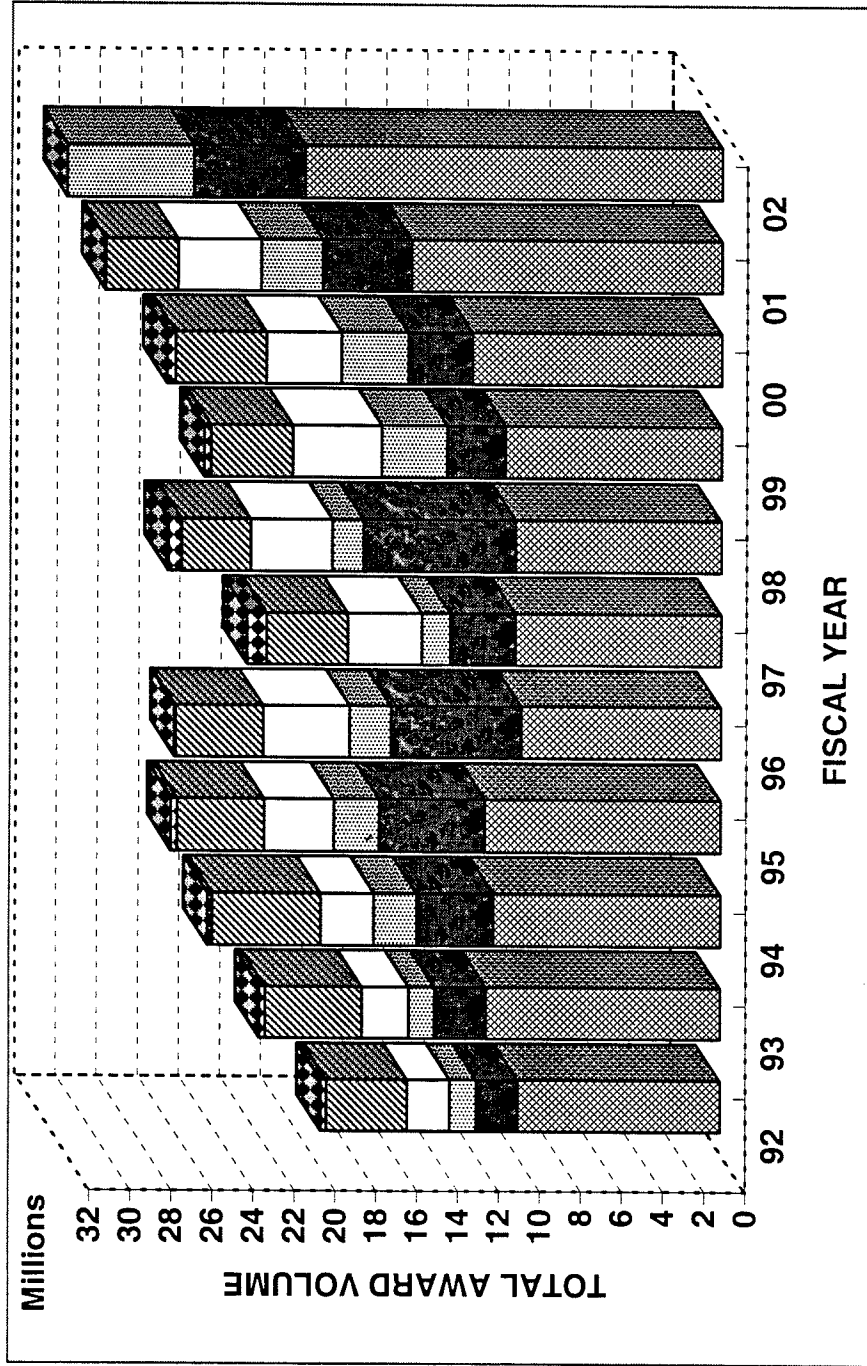

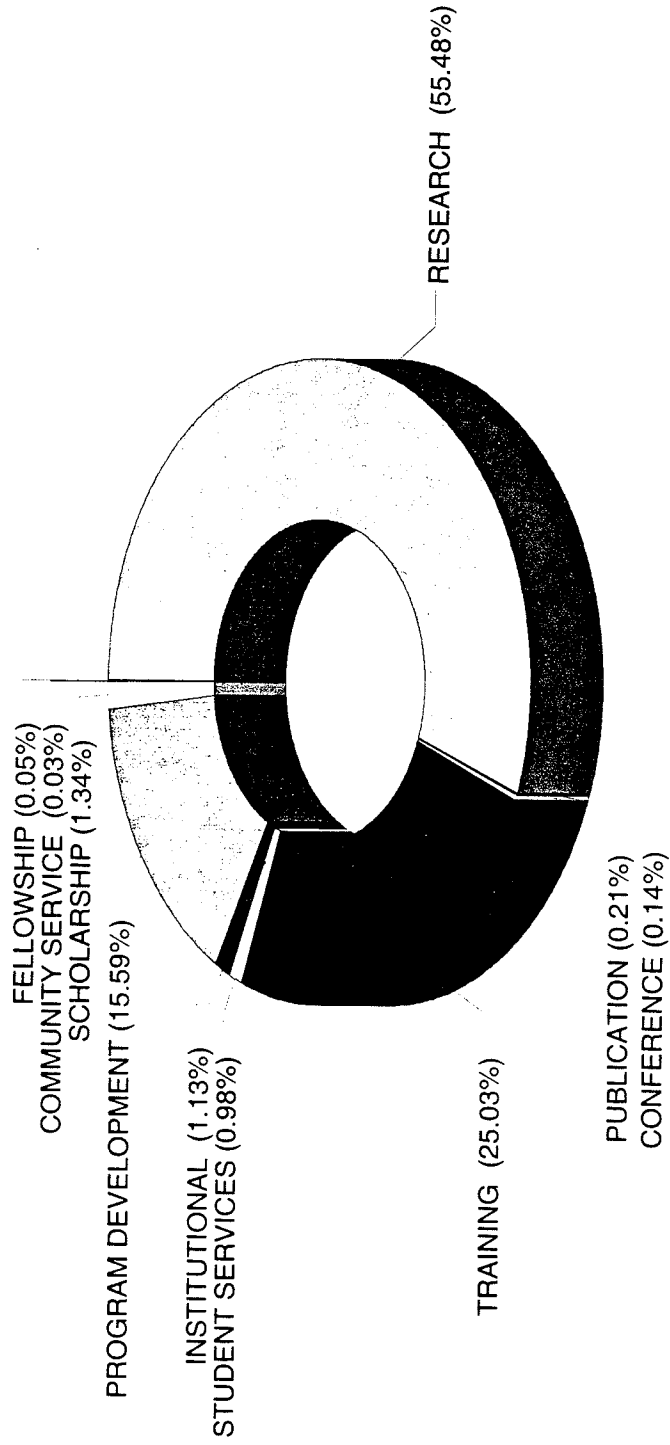

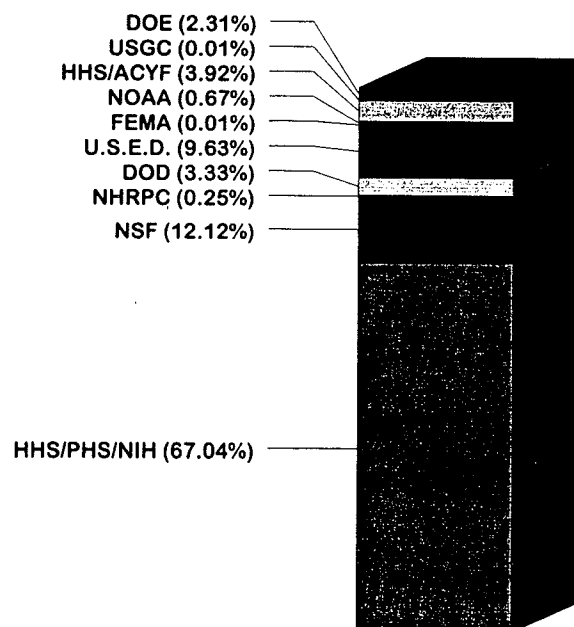
